This summer, I got to go to away Camp, again!

As we drove up the long gravel road that takes you into Glen Mhor, we were greeted by a group of L.I.T.s (Leaders in Training) who were waving and welcoming us home. As we drove further along the road, staff welcomed us home and helped get us oriented. We were told where to register and were taken to cabins. Then the games began and strangers quickly became friends. A community was formed.

Days began early, finished well after sunset and consisted of a lovely relaxed rhythm with God at the very centre. In the morning we gathered on the playing field to sing, to pray and to reflect on the theme for the day. Before meals, we asked a blessing in song and cabins took turns leading a spoken prayer. Midmorning, campers gathered to sing, hear a story about faith and courage from the Bible and to reflect on what that story might mean for them today. We created responses, we talked and we prayed. In the afternoon, the L.I.T.s had their Bible Study. There were big questions asked during these studies. On Tuesday, they asked me to talk to them about discernment. After dinner, the staff had their Bible Study time. They filled out gratitude journals as they reflected on the day. There was lots of singing and many, many, more big questions. We talked about God's grace one evening. Another evening they asked to put me on the "hot seat" and so many deep and important questions about faith were asked very quickly and pondered together. After evening programme, the whole Camp gathered for Worship. It was relaxed and joy-filled. There was more music. (I am in awe of the musical talent and leadership!) We prayed and we told stories. On Friday night, we gathered at the beach to hear the story of Jesus and the fishermen until it rained – really rained hard. Worship was quickly moved to the Lodge. Each day, as a community, ended with thanking God for the day and friends for their part in it. The week ended with a time of remembering, of looking forward and giving thanks.

Throughout the week Campers took part in art and drama. Some played ukuleles and even let me try. There were adventures on the high ropes and low ropes and archery field. There was swimming, kayaking and canoeing. There were duties and laughter. Because it was "Outrageous Week", there was ice-cream for breakfast, pies in the face and a jump in the lake while everyone was fully dressed.

Camp is an interesting place that has structure and rules, fun and tradition. At meals, someone from each table needed to "hop" the food from the kitchen and then take the dishes back. Meals often ended with everyone standing on the benches and chanting a variety of silly songs. Then staff, wearing incredible costumes, would run into the lodge and make silly announcements about what was happening next. There is a measure of independence and responsibility for the campers that is very interesting to watch.

Camp is also wonderfully filled with support and affirmation. Things done well are praised. Attempts are praised. Potentially challenging situations are offered dignity and made into something fun which speaks so much of the leadership! They are an amazing group of faithful, caring and talented people who are willing to do what it takes to make things happen and to laugh at themselves in the process. The Campers, the Camp and we as the larger Church are blessed to have them serving in these roles.

There is a wonderful, vital and important ministry taking place at Camp Cairn. Thank you for allowing me to go and be a part of it for a week this summer! I am truly grateful to have had the opportunity!!

Prayer Shawl Group

We just wanted to let you know what goes on every Tuesday afternoon 1:00-3:00 pm in the Lounge off the sanctuary.

In the past 6 months 23 members have created (knitted or crocheted) 103 prayer shawls of which 78 have been delivered mostly by the members in person. Of note, 15 were sent via a friend of Robynne Hutton's, to Fort McMurray after their devastating fire.

We come together to pray for each person (who knitted or crocheted) and to bless each shawl created by reciting a prayer together with our hands on the shawls.

The shawls are usually delivered by group members to people in need - for example, who may be sick, receiving medical care, in hospital or who have lost a loved one.

A huge "Thank You!!" to the congregation who has supported us through donated yarn and funds. Thanks go to the Session of St Andrew's for their support of this mission and outreach program and the funds supplied from the Mission & Outreach budget.

Canada Youth Reflection

Canada Youth is a jam-packed week of fun, sharing laughs, finding new friends and connecting with old ones. CY really feels like home. It's a place where you can be yourself and be accepted for who you are. Not only do you have a blast, you grow deeper in your faith. As we reflect back on the week, many lessons we learned include deepening our faith, how to start new relationships and strengthen old ones, finding a home in Christ, and we also experienced a little of what it is like to be a refugee.

We were sorted into small groups called CASA groups, where we read scriptures about Ruth and Naomi. From that, we learned what it would be like to be alone and not have a home to go back to. We also played games and developed strong friendships in our micro groups.

During worship, we sang songs with the live band *Twain's Jackrabbit*. We watched live interpretations of the scripture, and listened to inspiring sermons.

We almost always felt God's presence in worship. Every night after worship, there was a themed games night. It was really fun to play games and meet and hang out with new people.

One day was dedicated to experiencing what it is like to be a refugee. Even though our simulation was nothing close to the experience of a real refugee, we learned how hard and uncomfortable it would be. To lose your home, family and friends, and then try to find a new home and be accepted there would be extremely difficult.

Overall, Canada Youth was so much fun. It was really great to be able to get together with youth from all over Canada. Thank you for your support and we really look forward to CY 2018.

Ghana with Youth in Mission

In Ghana, people living with disabilities and women suspected of witchcraft face many barriers to living healthy, happy and dignified lives. Misunderstood for their differences, they are neglected by their communities and have limited access to employment or education. Presbyterian World Service and Development is working with the Presbyterian Church of Ghana to overcome these barriers and empower vulnerable people to build brighter futures by advocating for human rights, inclusion and understanding in their communities. By teaching important life and vocational skills, people with disabilities discover their abilities and outcast women are reintegrated into their communities free from discrimination.

In the spring, I listened as the school choir at Phoebe Gilman P.S. asked, "Hey, do you want to go to Ghana?" I smiled and maybe even giggled to myself a little. The Church School talked about Ghana during their Partners Study, this past winter, as they learned about the "Possibility of Chocolate". The students had also focused on Ghana and the work of our Partners there a number of years ago as they learned about the Garu Community Based Rehabilitation Centre. This country in Western Africa keeps popping up in the most interesting, surprising and thought provoking ways.

Not so long ago, a group of young adults at St. Andrew's gathered together and decided that they would like to do something to effect change, and to learn about the work of the larger Church. We talked about ways to be involved in and through our congregation. We talked about larger ideas and the possibility of going on a Youth in Mission Trip. After great conversations and prayerful reflection, it was decided that the group would travel to Ghana in May of 2017.

"Hey, hey, we want to go to Ghana! Hey, hey, we want to come along," the song continued.

We will have the opportunity to visit the Garu Community Based Rehabilitation Centre that the Church School learned about and raised money to help. We will have the privilege of seeing the work that our Partners are doing to offer dignity, livelihoods and a new understanding of abilities and what is possible. We will also have privilege of visiting the Gambaga Go-Home Project, where women who were shunned after accusations of witchcraft are offered a place of safety and dignity while work is done to educate them and their communities so that they can go home.

We will see the amazing life-affirming things happening through the partnership of the Presbyterian Church in Canada and the Presbyterian Church in Ghana. We will have the opportunity to see God's love shared and hear about lives being changed.

I can only wonder how this trip will change the lives of those traveling to Ghana.

I can only wonder how the stories that will be shared will change the lives of people at St. Andrew's.



Good News From St. Andrew's Survey

In April of this year, St. Andrew's conducted what is called a "Natural Church Development" (NCD) survey. Our first such survey was in 2009 and the results allowed Session to set its priorities for the last 5 years.

The NCD survey is approved by The Presbyterian Church in Canada to assist congregations to determine their congregational health.

As required by the survey parameters, the Session invited 30 people to complete the 90 question survey as a representative sample of the congregation. These persons all met the survey criteria. In June the survey participants and members of Session received the first results.

The following is a brief summary of these results:

- 1. St. Andrew's scored higher than the average congregation in ALL eight of the characteristics that were tested.
- 2. The survey suggested that SERVICE comes most naturally to us as a congregation, FELLOWSHIP occupies the middle ground and FAITH comes less naturally to us. However, this is understandable given our commitment to live out our faith through our serving and caring ministries, and the fact that Presbyterians tend to be reserved when it comes to talking about their faith.
- 3. The survey also revealed that gift based ministry, empowering leadership and effective structures come <u>most naturally</u> to us; that loving relationships and holistic small groups occupy the middle ground; and that need-orientated evangelism, passionate spirituality and inspiring worship services do not come <u>as naturally</u> to us. Again, the same caution as given at the end of 2) above applies.
- 4. When our results are compared to other Canadian congregations it was found that we place in the top 15% health wise of all Canadian churches.
- 5. Our Synod Mission Consultant, whose task it is to analysis these results has already commented, *"I cannot begin to express how encouraging this survey is."*

In October our Synod consultant John-Peter Smit will meet with Session to give his further analysis, and then the Vision Committee of Session will suggest some priorities for ministry at St. Andrew's for Session to consider.

The Presbyterian Record To Cease Publication

The Presbyterian Record magazine which has faithfully served the church in Canada for 140 years has announced that, due to falling circulation and financial concerns, it will cease publication as of December 2016. This is a significant loss for our denomination but many print magazines with a targeted audience are facing the same reality today.

In order to continue facilitating communication within the

denomination, and to build upon the Presbyterian Record's legacy, the Life and Mission Agency of The Presbyterian Church in Canada will begin publication of a new resource that will merge some of the news and features once covered in the Record with educational and informational materials produced by the ministries, committees, and agencies of The Presbyterian Church in Canada. While the frequency and focus will be significantly different from the Record's, the purpose of this new publication will be to further equip leaders, connect congregations and missions, facilitate communication, and highlight denominational work strengthening our denominational ties across the country.

It is expected that refunds for unrealized issues of *The Record* will be refunded once full details are known.
